

Improving HPV Vaccination Rates in Schools

Did you know?

- Every year, more than 32,000 men and women develop a cancer caused by HPV.
- HPV vaccination could prevent more than 90% of these cancers from ever developing.
- The HPV vaccine series can start as early as age 9 and should be completed by age 13. HPV vaccination works best at ages 11 or 12, before HPV exposure.
- In the U.S., about 40% of girls and 50% of boys have not started the HPV vaccination series.
